Government of Alberta Surveys

The Government of Alberta is gathering feedback from the public and stakeholders to inform potential legislative changes related to councillor accountability in the *Municipal Government Act (MGA)* and changes to the *Local Authorities Election Act (LAEA)*. The potential changes are intended to improve accountability and maintain public trust in local elections and elected officials in Alberta municipalities. You are invited to share your perspectives on the potential changes through the online survey, which will be open from November 7, 2023 to December 6, 2023.

The *Municipal Government Act* (*MGA*) survey focuses on six areas related to councillor accountability:

- 1. Councillor training
- 2. Allowing council to meet in private
- 3. Disqualification rules for councillors
- 4. Minister's authority to remove a councillor
- 5. Changes to recall legislation
- 6. Clarify conflicts of interest

Land Use Bylaw Update

Land Use Bylaw 157-23 was given first reading on September 25 and a Public Hearing was held October 14. At the Public Hearing, a number of concerns and recommended changes and clarifications were presented. As a result, a number of changes have been made to the proposed bylaw and a second Public Hearing has been scheduled.

FireSmart in the Village

The Village has received FRIAA grants to continue to provide important FireSmart work. We have funding to complete Advanced Home Assessments for Residents, funds to update the Wildfire Preparedness Guide & Mitigation Strategy and funds to complete Vegetation Management in the Southwest portion of the Village.

Advanced Home Assessments - This program is a voluntary property assessment program for residents looking to determine and mitigate their home and property's risk to wildfire. The Advanced Home Assessment is conducted by a formally trained assessor. The assessor will visit the property with the resident and review key areas within the home ignition zones. The assessment will highlight areas of risk and provide specific recommendations of actions and upgrades residents can take to increase their property's resilience to wildfire. The assessor will provide a comprehensive report once the assessment is complete, which is sent *only* to the homeowner. Recommendations from the Home Assessments may include longer-term strategies such as installing fire-rated roofing material, as well as simple and short-term strategies such as cleaning up flammable debris (pine needles, leaves, etc.) against the side of your home. Many of these recommendations are a direct result of observations made during historical wildfires, or research projects conducted to test the resiliency of homes during a wildfire. The recommendations from the report are not mandatory for homeowners, they are meant to help homeowners increase the resiliency of their homes to a wildfire if a homeowner chooses to do so.

FireSmart in the Village

Wildfire Preparedness Guide & Mitigation Strategy – These documents were last updated in 2018 and it is recommended they be updated every 5 years. A review and update of the wildfire hazard assessment, a review of FireSmart mitigation accomplishments and setting of new FireSmart implementation priorities for the next 3 to 5-year period will be completed. An updated Wildfire Preparedness Guide will also be completed as part of this project.

Vegetation Management – Funding for completion of vegetation management in the southwest portion of the Village has been received and Alpine Precision Tree Services will be completing the work. They plan to start on Monday, December 4. They will be utilizing the Community Building parking lot for equipment storage and the Community Building for washroom access during their work. They will be piling the debris and burning the piles as weather conditions permit. Please give the contractor space to work and obey all signs and directions of the contractor while the work is being completed. If you have any questions, please contact Suzanne. Cougar Co-Existence Project Update

Earlier this year, the Exposed Wildlife Conservancy, a part of its Cougar Coexistence Project, asked you to share your experiences living and recreating with cougars. Your feedback provided the Conservancy with meaningful, relevant, and valuable information in regards to coexisting with wildlife and has resulted in the development of the Cougar Series.

Introducing the Cougar Series, the Conservancy's next step towards offering your community tailored, accessible, and practical resources, and educational programs centered around wildlife coexistence!

The Cougar Series is a great place where you can learn about cougar ecology, biology and behaviours, how to coexist with them on trails or at home, and much more.

Here is a preview of some interesting information about the elusive and solitary cougar that you will find in the Cougar Series:

- Cougars, also known as mountain lions, pumas, panthers, or catamounts in various parts of the world, are solitary animals and are one of the least aggressive of all of the world's large cats. In fact, cougars prefer to remain hidden from sight, avoid people as much as possible, and do not view humans as prey.
- Prey availability is among the most critical factors for the presence of cougars in any given area, with deer being their preferred prey. If their prey is migratory, the cougars will follow them.
- Cougars are both nocturnal and crepuscular. This means that cougars are most active (i.e. hunting) between the hours of twilight, dusk, and dawn and prefer to sleep during the day. However, in west-central Alberta, they have been observed hunting in the day, usually late afternoon and evening. Cougars are stealthy hunters who stalk their prey until they are close enough to attack. They do not hunt from trees and rarely sit and wait for prey.
- Unlike other big cats, cougars lack the specialized larynx and hyoid bone that other big cats have, which prevents them from roaring. Instead, cougars can purr and emit screams or high-pitched birdlike chirps which are often used by cougar mothers to attract the attention of their cubs.
